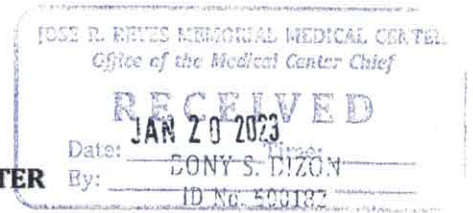

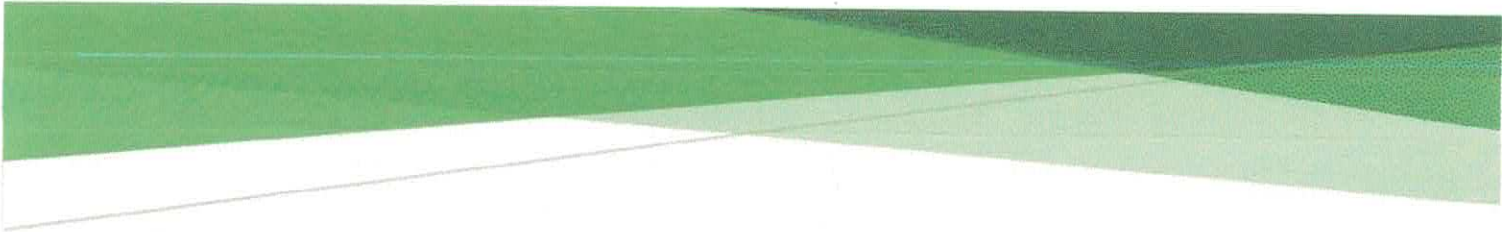

## MEDICAL SERVICE

### ANNUAL ACCOMPLISHMENT REPORT CY 2022

A glance at last year's medical accomplishments, developments and innovations, it has been proven that 2022 has continued to be a very challenging year for the Medical Service and our institution as a whole, mainly due to the on-going COVID-19 pandemic which has experienced a surge at the very start of year. Despite the constraints, the Medical Service pushed on with its different programs in service, training and research throughout the year.

*In these unprecedented times, we look for the silver lining amidst the pandemic, the spark of hope and assurance that everyone has to be empowered with the right knowledge on how to combat this virus at the same time has to advocate ways on how to carry on the tasks and conduct the "new business as usual." Recognizing the important role of health security to the steady rise of economy, we will continuously administer strategies to strongly support the public's welfare and address various health concerns. We have remained steadfast, resilient and evolving during these unprecedented times. We heal and rise as one.*

With the institution's priority, service to patients remains the first consideration of the Medical Service. There is an increase on the **total number of patients served with 349,642** as compared from last year's 256,655 due to the surge of the Omicron variant in January and the gradual ease of restriction for consultation. For this year, 50.21% came from OPD (including teleconsultations), 36.81% from emergency consultations, and 12.98% as admitted cases. We only had **8,487 total operations** with 46.74% as minor surgeries, 52.65% as major surgeries and 0.61% ambulatory.

At present, in addition to the supplies of personal protective equipment, we were still able to acquire donations of PPEs and alcohol for the use of different departments. These included masks, hazmat suits, face shields, gloves, gowns, caps and booties. These supplies are being used in order to provide self-protection, especially for our frontliners, while catering to our patients.

Since the onset of the pandemic, face-to-face interactions and engagements were strongly discouraged and the virtual/online continues to be the platform of choice, like Tele-consultations, Zoom meetings, conferences and webinars. However, as the gradual ease of

restriction has been lifted during the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter due to decreasing COVID-19 positive cases, face to face engagements slowly resumed while strictly following health protocol.

Constant growth and development in the training of our staff also took the forefront on this year's activities as many participated in several seminars, workshops, postgraduate courses and skills enhancement programs via online platform, such as PGS Orientation, Infection Control Practices Awareness Seminar, Gender Sensitivity Training, ARTA, Data Privacy, etc. This is in addition to the regular monthly Mortality and Morbidity Conferences, Tumor Board, Specialty Case/CPC Conferences, and various orientations.

In our commitment to strengthen our training program, the hospital had a total of 321 residents and fellows trained. All 16 Clinical Departments have maintained their accreditation status from their respective specialty boards.

We had a total of **534 medical trainees** for the year with 23 affiliate residents for the year, 259 postgraduate interns, and 252 affiliate Medical Clerks rotating in different areas. In the paramedical affiliate training, 45 Medical Technology Interns, 0 Radiological Interns, 33 Physical Therapy, 44 Occupational Therapy Interns, and 0 Psychiatry Interns rotated in our institution through virtual platform with a total of **122 Paramedical affiliates**.

*In research, the different clinical departments also produced relevant researches published in local journals and winning prizes from the different research fora both here and abroad. For this year, we have 76 research papers approved by the IRB, 195 proposed, 64 accomplished researches, and 88 on-going researches.*

Both the Medical and Paramedical staff also continue to upgrade their professional skills and competencies through continuing education and various learning and development activities.

Continuous upgrading of facilities, wards/department renovations, repainting of some areas and procurement of several equipment were also done for improvement of facilities and for better delivery of services. Continuous hiring and promotion of medical staff were also done to augment manpower.

The **JRRMMC Annex II – Hospital Extension** or known as the **DOH – QI Modular Facility**, which starts to operate last March 27, 2021 ended its operation last December 31, 2022. The said facility is situated at Quezon Insitute Compound Brgy. Doña Imeda, Quezon City.

The facility had referrals coming directly from the JRRMMC Main, OHCC (One Hospital Command Center) and other institutions. The said facility has been operating for **495 days** (from April 7, 2021 up to September 14, 2022), having a total of **539 admissions** with **498 recoveries (81.44%)**. Initially, only 2 Modules were operational, but in April 20, 2021 total of 5 Module has been opened to accept more incoming referrals.

Guided by the DOH calendar of health events, the **Public Health, Emerging Disease and Wellness Unit (PHEDWU)** and the wellness programs of the different departments continued to provide activities/lectures/information dissemination programs for patients. Some *surgical missions were conducted such as Hernia, Tuli, TURP & PCNL Missions and BTL, and REI Missions* among others. Other wellness programs were conducted via online platform such as lay fora and awareness lectures based on the calendar of Health Events Programs.

Continuous linkage with DOH, Health Promotion Bureau (HPB), DOH NCR Metro Manila Center for Health Development (MMCHD) HEPO links, to keep abreast with the pandemic and other DOH Health event as a guide in the conduct of health information /dissemination activities, as follows:

- Continuously requested IEC materials from DOH Health Promotion Bureau (HPB) and DOH NCR Media Relation Unit and reproduced same for advocacy activities, COVID 19 awareness, prevention and control. Reproduced IEC were distributed to targeted /designated clinical units/offices/entrance gate and at OPD waiting area depending on the scheduled health event
- Continuous utilization of TV monitors with videos at different strategic site as strategy in disseminating health information to the public especially on Covid-19 pandemic at the following areas:
  - OPD
  - Hospital lobby
  - Finger scanning area
  - Emergency Service Complex
  - Patient's Waiting Area
- Utilization of created social media page <https://www.facebook.com/publichealthJRRMMC> for information on COVID-19 and other health events for public awareness

**The Vaccination Core Team** together with PHEDWU also advocated in the nationwide campaign of Resbakuna Covid-19 Vaccination Program aimed at motivating the public to practice minimum health standard protocol and the acceptance of Covid-19 vaccine as an additional measure for the prevention and control of COVID 19.

On the other hand, the **Gender and Development Focal Point System (GAD)** continues to highlight the GAD Focal Point System's relentless effort to deliver the outputs vis-a-vis the targets and commitments as a result of greater collaboration and support by and between the members, program holders, stakeholders, and the top management, despite the challenges and limitations of COVID-19.

The GAD Focal Point System continuously engage and ultimately deliver output for mainstreaming. There is a slight shift from the online implementation of activities to face-to-face activities, hence, an increase in budget utilization. We were able not just to meet the five (5) percent allocated budget for GAD but exceeded the expected utilization.

The GAD Focal Point System maintains our goal to continuously capacitate members of the GFPS and the employees to address significantly the gap in providing gender-inclusive, responsive, and sensitive services to our clients.

The **Infection Prevention and Control Committee (IPCC)** relentlessly continues to be at the forefront, with several new and revised policies approved and implemented and several infection prevention and control orientations and training programs were conducted. Mentoring and coaching on proper donning and doffing to residents and staff in different areas/unit/ward. Areas were identified to manage Covid cases and identified staff to do fit testing in each area. They also had participation in planning for the process flow in admissions from ESC to ward transfer. IPCC have accomplished less than 1% hospital acquired infection rate of 0.63% and less than 2% needle stick injury/blood fluid exposure of 0.74%. There were 1,428 total Covid confirmed cases from January – December with 501 admitted, 289 discharged, 51 deaths, and 347 were under home/facility quarantine. The total number of our healthcare workers who were Covid Confirmed cases are as follows:

Also worth mentioning are some of the innovations and best practices such as the improvement of Pharmacy Inventory and Warehousing by application of Medicine and Management System with **99.61% prescriptions served** for this year. The D-Track System for Document Monitoring for improvement in the implementation of Claim Form 4; and continuous provision of free services, including outsourced services and referrals through our **Malasakit Center**.

COVID-19 pandemic continued to be a health concern with the National Capital Region (NCR) including neighboring places. Though there was lowering of confirmed cases before the celebration of holiday season, the quarantine status during the year has continued to impose adherence to minimum public health standards and motivation to submission to vaccination. Our hospital still observes limitation in the delivery of health care services like decrease in number of catered patients, the limitations of face to face communication, observance of the practice of *minimum health standards protocol wherein facial mask and shield, hand washing* were a must. Hence amidst the limitations, we continue to innovate and provide quality services despite the pandemic and the limited resources available.

There are still many things to be done for the coming year which includes continuous improvement of our services with acquisition of new equipment, specialty services and infrastructure developments. We also need to improve our quality assurance programs in providing better care to our patients. This is in line with our vision that JRRMMC will be a one-stop, world class, state-of-the-art institution providing high-quality, safe and cost-effective care to our patients and the leading center for education and training.

The Medical Service is truly indebted to all the people who tirelessly supported and contributed to the success of our endeavor.

## ANESTHESIOLOGY

### Highlight of Accomplishments:

The top accomplishment of the department for the year 2022 involves delivery quality patient care, by providing not only anesthetic care for surgical patients, but also acted as the airway team for the whole hospital during the time of the pandemic. We were able to deliver anesthetic care not only for our regular patients, but also for Covid suspect and positive patients as well.

1. Granted full three-year accreditation by the Philippine Board of Anesthesiology effective January 1, 2023 to December 31, 2026
2. Twenty seven (27) anesthesiology residents with the supervision of our fellow and consultant staff, service the needs of the following: ENT, Ophthalmology, Orthopedics, Neurosurgery, CT scan, MRI, General Surgery, Thoracic and Cardiovascular, Surgery, Pediatric Surgery, Obstetrics and Gynecology, Urology, Cystoscopy, Endoscopy, Delivery Room, Ambulatory OR, Recovery Room, Brachytherapy, Plastic Surgery, Minimal Invasive Surgery and OPD Pain Clinic

### 3. Intubations

The department was tapped to act as the primary airway team when the pandemic started, following both international and national recommendations. Being anesthesiologists, we were considered as airway experts, and most experienced in securing the airway, thus all patients for intubation were performed by our department. Listed below is the total number of intubations we were able to perform from the months of January to December of 2022.

### 4. Covid suspect or positive OR cases

Although not designated as a Covid center, our institution also had to cater to surgical patients who are suspected or positive with Covid-19. As such, the operating room complex was able to provide a designated operating room for such cases. Our department was able to formulate a protocol for the proper airway management and

donning and doffing for such cases. We were still able to deliver the appropriate anesthetic care for suspected or infected patients needing emergent surgery.

5. During the start of the pandemic, there was noted surge of patients in the emergency room. Aside from this the protocols in ER triage were revised, previously only one resident manned the triage for 24 hours which was revised to 2 residents every 12 hour shift. Due to the nature of the pandemic, many residents were being quarantined. Although our department's residents are not included in the rotation of ER triage, we were occasionally pulled out to man the ER triage to cover for other services
6. Conduction of lectures
7. Accomplished case report paper presentations
8. Attendance to online lectures/meetings/webinars

#### Issues and Concerns:

1. Drugs and Supplies
  - a. Supply of emergency drugs is scanty to none, therefore affecting management of our patients.
  - b. Some novelty drugs and supplies needed for the delivery of quality anesthesia care as recommended by the Philippine Board of Anesthesiology (PBA) either have no bidders or are not replenished on time, which is a *hindrance in optimal management of our patients.*
2. Equipment
  - a. Since the Engineering Department has outsourced the preventive maintenance of our Anesthesia Machines, reported problems are not being resolved immediately. The Engineering Department promptly responds, but some outsourced agents do not respond right away to the said reports.
  - b. *Scarcity of equipment optimal to delivery of quality anesthesia such as:* Forced air warmer. There is only 1 forced air warmer currently available for use and we have a total of 10 Operating Rooms (ORs).
  - c. Once all ORs open, there will not enough patient monitors and anesthesia machines to be used.



- d. Optimal equipment to protect residents from radiation is not available such as Lead apron with neck coverage.
- 3. Training
  - a. There is still a decreased number of cases and case mix for different subspecialties as compared to the pre-pandemic cases catered by our department.
  - b. *Internet connection within the hospital is unstable, making the residents have a hard time to participate in online conferences, which is now the new norm of acquiring new knowledge and skills.*
  - c. There is no protected time for residents whenever online discussions are held especially in preparation for the residents' in-service training examinations (RITE).
  - d. The department library currently serves as a stock room for unused PPEs, so there is no optimal place for the residents to study at.
  - e. Inadequate number of peripheral nerve blocks and pain management techniques due to lack of required equipment like local anesthetics, PNB needles, PCA pump, and PCA pump syringes. With this, the case mix of the residents is also affected which delays their completion of the residency program.
  - f. Since the pandemic began, there is limited interaction between the consultants and residents.

## BEHAVIORAL MEDICINE

### Highlight of Accomplishments:

1. The Department of Behavioral Medicine successfully accomplished delivery of the quality health care in the pandemic by educating their patients and relatives thru e-prescription and telephone inquiry. Likewise, we have extended our services to accommodate more of our employees and residents needing counselling, clearances and treatment. We provided continuous distribution of available and free medication to the patient of the department thru the allotted budget by the Department of Health under the Medicine Access Program – Mental Health.

## DERMATOLOGY

### Highlight of Accomplishments:

1. Passing rate of 100% (8/8) in the specialty board exam of the Philippine Dermatological Society (PDS)
2. Passing rate of 100% (2/2) the specialty board exam of the Dermatopathology Society of the Philippines (DSP)
3. Awards in research presentations and academic excellence
4. Conducted medical mission, patient's assistance fund, and outreach programs in cooperation with Skin Research Foundation of the Philippines, Inc.
5. The department was officially awarded the name "National Specialty Center for Dermatology". Mr. Learsy Afable and members of the Department of Health (DOH) conducted an online conference with the representatives of the different DOH specialty centers to finalize the costing for the Specialty Development Plan
6. In 2022, the request, procurement, and acquisition of equipment as planned and hiring of new specialists for the National Specialty Center in Dermatology started.
7. Also in 2022, the National Specialty Center for Dermatology and the Department of Health worked on the following:
  - a. Creation of the Resource Stratified Framework which delineates roles, minimum service capabilities, resource requirements, and accountabilities for facilities in each level of care in the HCPN
  - b. Formulation of the Staffing Standards which will be used for the basis for staffing in DOH hospitals
  - c. Conceptualization of the Organizational Charts for all Dermatology Specialty Centers
8. Continuous upgrade of facilities and equipment
9. Created virtual modules and demonstration videos of dermatologic surgery procedures to compensate for the lack of hands-on learning
10. Conduction of virtual workshops/lectures
11. Attendance to online lectures/meetings/webinars/conferences

### Issues and Concerns:

1. Instances of lack of hospital supplies (i.e. cover slips, glass slides, paraffin wax, absolute alcohol, and carbol fuchsin powder for Dermatopathology use) wherein the department has to shoulder the expenses.
2. Unavailability of special stains and immunohistochemical stains in Dermatopathology. Specimen sent out to outside laboratories.
3. Unavailability of most dermatological medications in the DOH Botika/ Pharmacy.
4. Non-replacement of department administrative aide to help in the recovery and filing of patient charts
5. Many dermatology residents contracted COVID-19 infection during the surge of the disease.

  - 8.3. Vacancy in the ward due to practice of physical distancing thus decreasing / limiting the bed capacity of clinical areas.

## ENT-HNS

### Highlight of Accomplishments:

1. Granted full accreditation by the Philippine Board of Otolaryngology-Head and Neck Surgery
2. A total of 4,065 patients seen and treated from January to December 2022 including both OPD and teleconsultation
3. A total of 161 patients in the subspecialty clinics including those patients that were referred virtually to the service consultants. Tumor clinic referrals has the highest patients seen.
4. There was progressive increase in number of patients seen on year 2022 with 48% increased from previous year with a total of 1,353 patients in the ER, most of which are Otology cases from January to December 2022.
5. There was total of 10% increase in the total number admitted of patients from previous year with a total of 161 admitted patients. Most cases are admitted under the Craniomaxillofacial service with trauma patients as our predominant cases.
6. The Pay Ward opened last May 2022 wherein we had a total of 17 pay patients from *May to December 2022*.
7. The number of elective OR days increased to 3x per week. A total of 164 patients were operated (164 charity case and 17 pay) from January to December 2022, with most cases coming from the Tumor/ Reconstructive Surgery service. Elective surgeries are done by the resident staff of the department, with the assistance of consultants or fellows during complicated cases.
8. Some of the patients seen at the Emergency Room needed to be managed surgically. A total of 33 emergency surgical procedures were done from January to December 2020, majority of which were cases of foreign body ingestion.
9. The first and second year residents did most of the service Minor Operations. Performing short procedures under local anesthesia, the junior residents honed their basic surgical skills in the Minor OR in preparation for the big cases at the major operating room. The minor OR area was under renovation and was temporarily closed since the start of the pandemic. Last May 2022, it was opened and was temporarily located on the 5th floor. We have performed 40 minor surgery cases from *May to December 2022*.
10. *We also cater to paying patients, and surgeries are done by our consultant staff, assisted by residents. Due to conversion of Pay ward into COVID ward, we have not done any surgeries to our pay patients since April 2020. But this was renovated last year and recently open last May 2022. We have catered 17 pay surgeries from May to December 2022.*
11. There was 28% increase in number of patients catered at the ENT Center with a total of 595 patients with pure tone audiometry as the most common procedure done. This year, our department was granted new ABR/ASSR machine which catered total of 17 patients from March to December 2022.
12. Last July 2022, we were also awarded to distribute hearing aid to our patients with a total of 24 units given this year.
13. In accordance with the government's programs emphasizing health care and maintenance catering to the senior citizens, Jose R. Reyes Memorial Medical administers the National Center for geriatric health. Department of ENT-HNS continues to provide consultations in this center every Monday from 9am to 12pm

until March 2020 due to the pandemic. Even though we couldn't do the geriatric consultations at this center, we had our teleconsultation to address their ENT problems.

14. Under the Republic Act (R.A.) No. 9709 otherwise known as the Universal Newborn Hearing Screening Act of 2009, the Newborn Hearing Screening/OAE has already been included and approved as part of the Newborn Screening Protocol covered by PHILHEALTH. All newborns are required to undergo newborn hearing screening at the nursery at a specified time following the hearing screening protocol.
15. As part of the hospital's Wellness Program, each department concerned conducts lectures for the laymen with topics regarding any particular activity scheduled by the Department of Health on a given month and week such as Thyroid Cancer Awareness, World Hearing Week, Craniofacial Awareness, Cleft Lip Palate Awareness Week and Head and Neck Tumor Awareness.
16. In its commitment to constantly strengthen its residency training program, the Department held 2 in-house courses: Basic Plastic Surgery (*PATA course*), Maxilomandibular Fixation Workshop and 1 nationwide course entitled ENT made easy 2022: Pandemic practical pearls attended by 250 participants with the presence of our very own specialists to facilitate such events.

1. Utilization of certain areas like the 4<sup>th</sup> floor solarium and the ENT-HNS Ward. may be put into good use by our Department, as we also plan to create a Prosthesis and Skills Laboratory that would cater to patients with cleft deformities and facial tumors in need of reconstruction
2. Granting of 4-year accreditation entails compliance to the rules set by the Board, like the provision of 2-3 beds (2-3 patients) per resident of the Department, and the provision of working equipment to be used
3. Additional OR days from 3x/week to 5x/week just like before the pandemic to maximize resident's learnings, enhance surgical skills and to meet their OR requirements

## INTERNAL MEDICINE

### Highlight of Accomplishments:

1. Continuous operation of the Hemodialysis Unit at Main JRRMMC and at the NCGH.
2. The Department of Internal Medicine - Section of Nephrology remained with 1 year of recognized status by the Philippine Society of Nephrology for their Fellowship Training.
3. The Department of Internal Medicine - Section of Medical Oncology remained with 2 years of full accreditation status by the Philippine Society of Medical Oncology for their Fellowship Training.
4. Medical Officers are regularly evaluated on their performance monthly which includes attitude, clinical performance and patient quality care using a standardized rubrics provided by the Philippines College of Physicians as well as this institution. Bi-annually, the medical residents are being evaluated through written and oral examinations given by the department. Quizzes held post-lectures were done in accordance to PCP recommendations. Feedbacks on their performance were also being given quarterly. Patient rounds with the respective consultants are regularly conducted either via virtual platform or physical rounds.
5. Conducted regular department activities such as Monthly Mortality and Morbidity Conference and Medical Grand Rounds
6. The department remains active in the different outreach programs mostly sponsored by the hospital.
7. With the recent reopening of face-to-face consultations, the department is currently reviving its outreach programs namely HINGA club for asthmatic patients and PUMA (Pusong Malusog) club for cardiac patients.
8. All admissions were resident-managed cases. There were a total of 26 residents (8 third years, 8 YL 2 residents and 10 YL 1 residents) with a case-load of 57 patients per resident from January to December 2022. Patient's rounds under the supervision of their respective consultants are regularly conducted either via virtual platform or physical rounds. Subspecialty referrals are being seen by both the YL2 and YL3 residents with the supervision of consultants.

## OB-GYNECOLOGY

#### Highlight of Accomplishments:

1. The department continued to cater patients not only from Metro Manila but also those from nearby provinces despite the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic through the Health Care Provider Network formerly known as Service Delivery Network (SDN).
2. The department continued catering COVID-19 suspects and confirmed obstetrics and gynecologic cases as our institution is considered a COVID hospital with the establishment of the Off-site facility in Q1.
3. The department was able to perform significant number of major and minor gynecologic procedures despite the pandemic.
4. The Department's Online Telekonsulta was recognized by the hospital administrators and was set as benchmark for other departments due to its systematic and efficient way of managing patients online.

5. The department was able to put up a digital queueing machine at the Outpatient department and being utilized during face to face consultation. This strengthen and upgrade our services as well as rendered a more systematic turnover of patients, enhanced staff productivity and increased patient's satisfaction while upholding the hospital's data privacy system.
6. The department was able to conduct series of webinars for information dissemination particularly with regards to teenage pregnancy, responsible family planning, breastfeeding, gender equality, and violence against women and children.
7. The department also had multiple ongoing collaborative research/scientific works to *improve the quality of care and management given to our patients such as MULTICONOPOP STUDY and SUCCESS STUDY.*
8. The Section of Gynecologic Oncology was awarded with Z-Benefit Contracts for cervical cancer patients by the Department of Health last September 23, 2022.
9. The Section of OB-GYN-Ultrasound was visited by the Philippine Society of Ultrasound in Obstetrics and Gynecology last October 19, 2022 and was granted with full 3-year Accreditation Fellowship Training Program.
10. The Philippine Obstetrics and Gynecologic Society Annual Convention and 76th Anniversary Celebration: a hybrid convention with the theme "POGS: Kabalik at sa Pagsulong sa Kalusugan at Karapatan ng Kababaihan" was held last November 8-11, 2022. Two (2) consultants were voted as officers of POGS. Dr. Leilani Chavez-Coloma as reelected Board Secretary and Dr. Anna Belen Ignacio-Alensuela as members of the Board of Trustees.
11. The department was able to conduct its 2nd virtual Post Graduate Course SMART-Simplified Management Approach, Recognition and Treatment of Emerging OB-GYN Diseases (16th Post Graduate Course. This was held for 3 days with lectures from different subspecialist and was attended by 1,741 participants.

A mass was first held as a thanksgiving for a successful year followed by the main celebration. As was done last year in lieu of the exchange gift a cash donation was opted to be given to the victims of the typhoon Odette*
13. The Section of Gynecologic Oncology held their Annual Christmas party last December 7, 2022, face to face bring joy and hope to the patients and their families. ## OPHTHALMOLOGY

**Highlight of Accomplishments:**

1. The department has successfully catered to **21,519** patients in 2022 which included Outpatient Department Clinics catering to both general ophthalmology and subspecialty cases, Teleconsultation, Emergency Room Services, Main and Minor Operation Services, and Ward Admissions.
2. Various ancillary diagnostic procedures, as well as laser procedures were performed which greatly exceeded the census of the past two years. A total of **1,679** eye surgeries were performed at the Minor and Main Operating rooms, and the Emergency room.
3. The "No Balance Billing" policy of Philhealth for all its members is strictly observed in the department. Patients who are not under Philhealth are enrolled or directed to our Social Service department to cover their medical expenses. The filing of claims was facilitated by the residents who filled up the ICD codes and RVS immediately after the operative procedure. PHIC Claim Form completely filled out and signed immediately after operative procedure before submission to Philhealth, which *undoubtedly facilitated collection of PHIC reimbursements of the hospital*
4. The department is currently an accredited Philippine Board of Ophthalmology
5. Extensive training activities which included the regular clinical conferences, and both written and oral exams, continued albeit virtually, once distancing restrictions were in place
6. The department had one hundred percent passing rate in the recent Philippine Board of Ophthalmology Certifying Exam for the last 3 consecutive years. Another accomplishment is a passing rate of 92% in the recent the Philippine Board of Ophthalmology resident in-service exam.
7. To make up for the decrease in patient interaction, each subspecialty have scheduled weekly conferences among the consultants and residents
8. The department was able to procure new equipment such as Specular Microscope, Portable retina camera for pediatric ocular imaging, Portable fundus camera, Automated Visual Field machine, Autorefractor with corneal topography machine, Posterior Vitrectomy machine among others
9. Other accomplishments include the repair and preventive maintenance of our various equipment (Phacoemulsification machine, Leica operating microscope, Humphrey Visual Field Analyzer, Lumera 700 Operating Microscope, OMS 90 Microscope,

Fluorescein Angiography, Optical Coherence Tomography machines and indirect ophthalmoscopes)

10. Participation to various local and international conferences
11. Awards in research presentations
12. Attendance to online lectures/meetings/webinars/conferences

**Issues and Concerns:**

1. Limited OR days for the main operating room
2. Limited number of staff to cater for the needs of the Eye Center and Ophthalmology Operating room (e.g. encoder, ophthalmic nurse, ophthalmic technician, nursing attendant)
3. Some equipment are already outdated (e.g. ophthalmic microscope)
4. Crowded working area at the Ophthalmology OPD/Eye Center and Operating rooms
5. Limited capacity for certain diagnostic tests in our institution (e.g. neuroimaging, blood tests, etc.)
6. Lack of negative pressure capability at the Minor OR
7. Record archiving and retrieval
8. Internet restriction for teleconsult platforms and surgical videos for learning purposes

## ORTHOPAEDICS

**Highlight of Accomplishments:**

1. Granted conditional accreditation by the Philippine Board of Orthopedics covering the period from June 2022 to June 2023.
2. Garnered 100% (2/2) passing rate in the recent Philippine Board of Orthopedics Diplomate Examination last July 2022
3. Five (5) graduates passed the Philippine Board of Orthopaedics Qualifying Examination last October 2022
4. Since 2021, our department has been providing indigent patients with free implants to be used for surgical procedures. For 2022, free implants were awarded to the department for use on indigent patients.
5. Conducted Post-graduate Course “Looking in, to Look Forward: A Face-to-Face Course on Arthroscopy”, JRRMMC Department of Orthopaedics: 13<sup>th</sup> Post-Graduate Course, Luxent Hotel, 30 July 2022
6. There were a total of 2,301 procedures with Adult Ortho comprising majority of these cases. Marked increase in trauma cases was seen secondary to the free implants provided for our charity patients and the return of our pay ward. Besides emergency cases, elective trauma cases were also surveyed well by our teleconsultation service.
7. Marked increase in all orthopaedic cases mainly due to the availability of free implants and improved teleconsultation services.

## RADIOLOGY

**Highlight of Accomplishments:**

1. Updated Certificate of Compliance from DOH-CDRRHR in all modalities valid for 5 years
2. A total of 39,067 patients were seen (routine and special X-Ray procedures combined), 24.96% came from the wards, 17.97% from OPD, and 57.01% from the ER. 53.20% are males, and 46.79% are females. Chest X-Ray is still the most common procedure comprising about % of 58.30 of all X-Ray cases, followed by pelvis (7.79%) and forearm (4.97%) X-Rays. The month of November recorded the highest number of patients (3,962) while January was the lowest (2,357).
3. A total of 245 patients were seen, 97.96% came from OPD and 2.04% from the wards for mammogram.
4. Total of 6,482 ultrasound procedures were seen, 28.68% came from the wards, 37.10% from OPD, and 34.22% from the ER. KUB is the most commonly requested procedure (19.36%), followed by Whole Abdomen (17.29%) and FAST (14.35%). The month of September recorded the highest number of cases (700) while January was the lowest (218).
5. A total of 7,136 CT scan procedures were done, 28.62% came from the wards, 35.33% from OPD, and 36.06% from the ER. Cranial CT scan is the most commonly requested procedure (39.80%), followed by whole abdomen (16.54%) and chest (14.98%). The month of September recorded the highest number of cases (809), whereas February was the lowest (14).
6. A total of 1,911 MRI procedures were done, 44.22% came from the wards, 55.78% from OPD, and none from the ER. Cranial MRI is the most commonly requested procedure (54.11%), followed by lumbar spine (8.37%) and pelvis (7.27%). The month of October recorded the highest number of cases (214), whereas January was the lowest (51).

## RADIOTHERAPY

5. Image guided brachytherapy for cervical cancer has been ongoing every Friday using the dedicated Siemens CT simulator located at the Radiotherapy department.
6. The department has contributed to the creation of Z package for cervical cancer with the section of gynecologic oncology.
7. The department has been a training hub/center for medical physicist and radiologic technology therapists of other DOH hospitals in the provinces that are acquiring LINAC machines and Brachytherapy machines.
8. The department has acquired a new dedicated BKSpecto Ultrasound System which can be used for gynecologic and prostate brachytherapy.
9. The department has received additional brachytherapy applicators and needle guides as a donation from International Atomic Energy Agency
